




MCACN invites a huge wing car collection and a whole lot more to its winter wonderland.

The highlight for the purists was the debut of the very first Chrysler 300 courtesy Mike McCandless and Whitehall Restorations out of Massachusetts. This was the car that set all the records on the sand of Daytona that year. Fresh from the shop, Mike was unable to attend the event, so father Herb and restorer Tom White valiantly stood in for him with the ladies, Brenda Walls and Joy Curran.



Of all the stuff in the Norm's display, from '65 Hemicars to vans and funny cars, one of the neatest things was this scale dealership model with a plethora of Johnny Lighting Mopar machines around and inside it.

HERE IS MUCH TO BE SAID about "easy access." Hey, ever work around big-tube headers on a 440 A-body? You know what we mean. Event access is the same way; a cheap hotel an hour from the show is still a PITA (no, not bread, Pain In The A\$\$!). The biggest thing about coming to MCACN (Muscle Car & Corvette Nationals) is that you take the shuttle from Chicago O'Hare International Airport for about 5 minutes and you are both near the hotel and the Donald E. dar, which chose to highlight Daytonas and SuperBirds this time around! Not just a couple, but as the primary theme in the main aisle walkway, in





the Wellborn Museum-sponsored Aero Warrior area, around Mecum's big auction display, in the Vintage Certification area and even in the Barn Finds section. There were a few Charger 500s tossed in as well. These wings were not run-of-the-mill versions, either, as the prototype of all Daytonas was there, as was the Bonneville land speed SuperBird and never-seen cars that came down from Canada and elsewhere.

So what wing was most popular? A wreck! The orange SuperBird that showed up upside down on Youtube after Hurricane Ian hit Ft. Myers was the highlight of the Magnum shop's area, who will







"Yo, man, that wing thing just ain't my bag," said...nobody ever. Seriously, not everyone is smitten with all aero specials all the time, and manager Bob Ashton knows it. So there was also a special Mr. Norm's memorial section, a Kramer Automotive-sponsored Legends of Super Stock section with mostly Mope iron, a special Maple Leaf Muscle Canadian car display, a Class of '72 showcase, the Wellborn group, many cars done by the latest shops, and a first-ever Malaise-Era Muscle for post 1974 models that even included the prototype Mirada featured elsewhere in this issue. More Mopar iron was in the back and rear display areas, and all this made this for a pretty amazing one-time-only car collection (it'll be all different next year).

You could write a book and still have a hard time showing everything that happens here, so we had to edit our 1800 photos down to a mere 20. Meanwhile, we know that Mr. Ashton & Co. are already planning for 2023. No MCACN event is complete without a slew of E-bodies. Several shops debuted examples, but we went with this Sassy Grass Green '71 Hemi'Cuda owned by Barry Boyles in the Maple Leaf Muscle display. It's one of 59 4-speeds built that final year, with a lot of docs and a mile-long list of options. "The grass is always greener on the other side?" In this case, yes...



In the Class of '72 Invitational were two 340-powered Dodges, the Ramcharger-equipped Charger Rallye of Mark Young and the Challenger Rallye of Mark Obenour, both from Ohio.





In the Barn Finds section was this Formula S 340 Barracuda convertible that is believed to have been used to prototype some of the model changes for 1969 season. The original engine block was with it. Needs a little work...



Lots to see in the Wellborn Museum aero car display as well, and we needed a Daytona. We know originality matters, and Dan LeClerc brought his 440 Daytona down from Quebec. You know, it might buff out (to bare metal.)

We'd already picked, but our second choice for celeb pick would have been the old Jack Ferris Motors '67 RO Plymouth that Charlie and Denise Caldwell debuted here. Driven on the UDRA circuit by the late Jack Thomas, the rising sun paint theme has not been on its sheetmetal in a half-century. You can the real Sox & Martin car behind it, and, past that is another row of '67 Mopars, which included the notorious Silver Bullet.

Rick E talks about doing grille blackout. This SuperBird in Lemon Twist was on display thanks to Jeff and Brent Kultgen of Minnesota and showed OEM blackout spray gun creativity.







Leading of this row of Mopes in the Malaise Era Muscle was the Aztec Gold 1975 Road Runner of Harold Schutz of Indiana. These cars and those seen behind it are proving to be quite scarce today and are growing in interest.



In the Kramer Automotive display "Legends of Super Stock", we gave our Celebrity Pick to the incredible 1965 A990 Plymouth Hemi drag car that Steve Atwell recently found. Just prepped and repainted by Hemi Eddie Strzelcecki (pronounced: "Ed"), this car is otherwise completely original and had been parked in storage almost since new.
